Medicines and mother's milk



Can I take medicine while I am breastfeeding or pumping?

There are many medicines, both over-the-counter and prescription, that you can still take while you are breastfeeding or pumping.

- Make sure your doctors know that you are breastfeeding or pumping before they prescribe medicines for you.
- Write the medicines you are taking on the breast milk label.
- If you are not sure if your breast milk can be used for your baby while you are taking medicine, keep pumping and store your breast milk until you talk with your lactation consultant or doctor.

Who can I call to make sure the medicines my doctor prescribes are OK to take?

Talk with a lactation consultant, pharmacist or doctor about any medicines you are taking while breastfeeding or pumping. You can also get more details by calling:
